A note from our FUSION Leadership

FUSION is a nonprofit set within a landscape of other nonprofits, all working to achieve the important work of eliminating or mitigating homelessness for families. From our Board of Directors, to our staff, to the volunteers who support our organization, we all work toward this shared vision of rendering homelessness a non-issue.

As we know, this issue impacts us all, to some degree. It is painful and distressful to see individuals on our streets who exhibit the hallmark signs of being homeless. What may not be apparent to many though, is that families experiencing homelessness tend to fly under the radar as they do their best to sustain the normal behaviors of family life—school, work, belonging to their community—while experiencing homelessness.

Every family comes to us with their own specific set of needs, and our professional staff works to meet them where they are. This is achieved through a Family Stability Plan that is created by the family in consultation with their case manager. It is basically a road map with necessary steps identified that will include not only housing, but also employment, transportation challenges, and children with specific needs.

For most families, their stability plan can be achieved within ninety days, and we house these families at our Pete Andersen FUSION Family Center. For families that encounter more barriers to success, we work to place them in our transitional homes located in King and Pierce counties. These families have up to eighteen months to maximize their stability plan. We believe that all families deserve to feel safe, sheltered, and warm as they work their way back to self-sufficiency.

We are very much engaged as an organization in solving the intractable problem of homelessness, and there is a lot of joy and happiness that occurs along the way. We regularly plan holiday events for back to school, Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Mother's Day and Father's Day celebrations are also eagerly anticipated. We identify birthdays for the little ones, teen events such as graduation and prom, and a host of other smaller events that let our families know they are very much cared for and at the center of our thoughts and actions.

We invite you all to become a part of these celebratory activities and problem-solving! We can think of few other causes that can be so rewarding and that remind each and every one of us about the importance of family and home.

Founded in 1993, FUSION is professionally staffed and volunteer supported. The organization owns and operates 20 transitional homes in King and Pierce counties and a 90-bed emergency shelter for families with minor children in their care.

FUSION also runs the FUSION Décor Boutique which sells gently-used furnishings, as well as Poverty Bay Café, with a plan to reopen in 2022.

These businesses provide funding for FUSION programs, create community awareness of the mission, and engage new volunteers.

The Pete Andersen FUSION Family Center	"The Pete" in Federal Way shelters families in 31 private rooms. A professional support team provides crisis care and assists in securing employment and permanent housing.		
FUSION Décor Boutique	Our upscale resale home furnishings store operating since 2014 is a unique shopping experience. All gently-used merchandise is donated. All staff are volunteers.		
Poverty Bay Café by FUSION	Planning to reopen in 2022, this popular bistro adjacent to our Boutique store features great food, camaraderie, and award-winning coffee beverages. Job skills training will provide employment opportunities for low-income adults.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

FUSION owns and operates twenty transitional housing units in King and Pierce Counties with plans to acquire additional units in 2022 and 2023.

Dedicated case management assists resident families in reaching the stability of employment and a permanent home in their progression to self-sufficiency.

THE PETE ANDERSEN FUSION FAMILY CENTER

"The Pete" is a 90-bed emergency shelter for families with minor children in their care. The facility was opened on Christmas Eve in 2020 with the very first family moving in just before the holiday.



Located in Federal Way, the center offers crisis care with secure private rooms and a professional support team to families coming from all over King and Pierce Counties.

Our shelter program has transformed lives:

"The Pete Andersen FUSION Family Center offered my family a true opportunity to begin our lives again after experiencing trauma and displacement due to domestic abuse. The hardest decision I ever had to make was to flee, but the smartest was getting connected with FUSION."

"From the very first time I walked up to the doors of the center, I felt relief. Something I hadn't felt in a very long time. I feel embraced and supported while I get back on my feet. And just as important as that, my kids are safe, in a place where they can just be kids again."

A unique FUSION-created Finally Home Fund disbursed \$15,000 to 11 families for application fees, first month's rent, utility deposits and other immediate expenses for moving into permanent housing in 2021.


VOLUNTEERS AT WORK

Our volunteers are the lifeblood of FUSION.

Growth and achievements of FUSION are directly related to the dedication of its volunteer force.

Our 240 active volunteers contributed nearly 23,000 hours of service in 2021. The minimum wage equivalent for the time and work that was donated to the FUSION organization is equal to approximately \$360,000.

Local businesses, civic organizations, and church groups contributed priceless hours in service.







- 23 Housing Team volunteers spent 3,555 hours cleaning, repairing, and furnishing 11 transitional homes for families.
- 54 Décor Boutique volunteers devoted 14,185 hours picking up donations, staging furniture, and assisting customers in the store.
- Dozens of volunteers contributed 2,500 hours planning, organizing, and contributing to our 2021 Garden of the Gods Summer Art Event.
- Additional volunteers gave 2,600 hours of service to the Family Center, Poverty Bay Café, and Operations Team.
