A note from our Executive Director

In this first year of serving as Executive Director for FUSION, I am humbled, amazed, and impressed with our direct services team and the hundreds of volunteers who give passionately to support our cause of ending homelessness. I am honored to serve side by side with every one of them.

This past year has represented one of tremendous growth for FUSION. The Pete Andersen FUSION Family Center which opened on December 24, 2020 with just one family, now regularly serves up to thirty families at any given time as we work to help them return to selfsufficiency. This is in addition to the transitional homes that have formed the basis of our longstanding service to the community. Our transitional housing has enjoyed broad and deep volunteer support, starting with the original ladies seated at Peggy LaPorte's kitchen table. With all of the accomplishments we can point to, and revel in, we remain steadfast with a growth mindset that we can do more and do better, and at a time when the need has never been areater.

Operationally, we have dedicated many hours of team meetings to talk about policies, best practices, and how to realistically implement both with families who are in very dynamic and fluid situations. For our staff, it can be stressful and demanding work that requires patience, coordinated team efforts, and remaining resilient while working with families confronted with challenging circumstances at best.

It is a rewarding and uplifting experience to see families come through our doors at a low point in their lives, and then start to regain hope and forward momentum in returning their lives to stability. This is accomplished through thoughtful case management support from a myriad of service organizations and regional places of worship who are ready to jump in and lend their support. And sometimes a kind word or friendly face will help set the tone for the day. We also draw hope and inspiration from the families themselves as they navigate through uncertainty. This is the work we do at FUSION.

FUSION's mission would not be complete without talking about the Boutique which is a 100% volunteer run retail business that provides essential revenue to help underwrite the cost of running our homelessness programs. Through donated furniture from individuals and businesses like Lennar, we are able to create a synergy around "upscale recycled furniture" that positively impacts our community.

One of my primary objectives in my leadership role is to keep our team focused on outcomes and that we do everything in our power to ensure that families do not return to homelessness. It is rewarding work and sometimes not work at all. We invite you to continue on this journey with us as we work to end homelessness.

A note from our Board Chairperson

As I think back to 2022, FUSION experienced astounding growth. Several highlights come to mind.

First, we added two transitional homes to our inventory. These two new homes are currently undergoing much needed remodeling and repairing before they are move-in ready. Once they are habitable, a family will stay in each for up to twelve months as they save money to transition back into a permanent home. We celebrate the success rate of 90 percent of our transitional families achieving a return to permanent housing.

Second, with financial support from the City of Federal Way, FUSION organized a below-freezing weather response to get people into our shelter during frigid temperatures this winter. Similarly, our staff will lead a program if the weather turns extremely hot this summer.

And third, we hired a Fund Development Manager who is expanding our outreach and fundraising within South King County, as well as into Pierce County.

With all these achievements, the area that most excites me is the activities we provide for families. Homelessness creates trauma—not just for the adults trying to meet basic needs for their families, but also for the children who are in unstable situations. At The Pete Andersen FUSION Family Center there are many activities open to all FUSION families to remind children they are kids, and to give families the opportunity for fun together.

Holidays are a special time at FUSION. One of my favorites is Halloween Trunk or Treat. Children and adults can choose just the right costume from an extensive collection donated to the cause. Volunteers dress in themed

costumes and park their decorated cars stocked with treats to hand out in the Family Center parking lot. Children collect candy at each car, and enjoy hot dogs, popcorn, and additional goodies. They also can decorate cookies and create a special Halloween art project. Is there anything cuter than kids of all ages running from trunk to trunk or carefully decorating a cookie with an inch of frosting? Who has more fun—the kids or the volunteers?

On Thanksgiving, FUSION families are invited to assemble for a meal prepared especially for them. Last year about seventy people shared in the holiday spirit together including volunteers, FUSION board members, and staff. In December, Lennar Homes, a valued partner with FUSION, sponsored a Breakfast with Santa at the Federal Way Performing Arts Center. Children greeted Santa as he arrived in an antique fire truck, had their picture taken with him, and had a wonderful breakfast.

In July some of our teens hiked through the Olympics for three days with the help of Peak 7 Adventures, an outfitter company based in Spokane. Our Executive Director, David Harrison, hiked with the group and had wonderful stories to share upon their return. Some of these kids had never been in the woods, let alone carried all their supplies on their backs. What an "aha moment" to find out their phones did not work and couldn't be recharged. These are the experiences that change lives.

With the sustained support from our FUSION friends, we continue to give a hand up to families experiencing homelessness, and to help enrich their lives as they return to self-sufficiency.

Founded in 1993, FUSION is professionally staffed and volunteer supported. The organization owns and operates 20 transitional homes in King and Pierce counties and a 90-bed emergency shelter for families with minor children in their care.

FUSION also runs the FUSION Décor Boutique which sells gently-used furnishings, as well as Poverty Bay Café, preparing to reopen in early 2023.

These businesses provide funding for FUSION programs, create community awareness of the mission, and engage new volunteers.

FUSION Décor Boutique	Our upscale resale home furnishings store operating since 2014 is a unique shopping experience. All gently-used merchandise is donated. All staff are volunteers.		
Poverty Bay Café by FUSION	Planning to reopen in early 2023, this popular bistro adjacent to our Boutique store features great food, camaraderie, and award-winning coffee beverages. Job skills training will provide employment opportunities for low-income adults in the near future.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

FUSION owns and operates twenty transitional housing units in King and Pierce Counties with two more being acquired in 2023.

Dedicated case management assists resident families in reaching the stability of employment and a permanent home in their progression to self-sufficiency.

THE PETE ANDERSEN FUSION FAMILY CENTER

"The Pete" is a 90-bed emergency shelter for families with minor children in their care. The facility was opened on Christmas Eve in 2020 with the very first family moving in just before the holiday.



Located in Federal Way, the center offers crisis care with secure private rooms and a professional support team to families coming from all over King and Pierce Counties.

Our shelter program has transformed lives:

"The Pete Andersen FUSION Family Center offered my family a true opportunity to begin our lives again after experiencing trauma and displacement due to domestic abuse. The hardest decision I ever had to make was to flee, but the smartest was getting connected with FUSION."


A unique FUSION-created Finally Home Fund disbursed \$20,000 to 27 families for application fees, first month's rent, utility deposits and other immediate expenses for moving into permanent housing in 2022.

FUSION DÉCOR BOUTIQUE

FUSION owns this unique retail operation that sells new, gently-used and donated furnishings. The store, operating since 2014, provides funding for FUSION programs, creates community awareness of our mission, and engages new volunteers.

- Proceeds from the Boutique make up approximately 23% of FUSION's annual revenue budget


VOLUNTEERS AT WORK

Our volunteers are the lifeblood of FUSION.

Growth and achievements of FUSION are directly related to the dedication of its volunteer force.

Our 140+ active volunteers contributed nearly 25,000 hours of service in 2022. The minimum wage equivalent for the time and work that was donated to the FUSION organization is equal to approximately \$360,000.

Local businesses, civic organizations, and church groups contributed priceless hours in service.







- 24 Housing Team volunteers spent 3,374 hours cleaning, repairing, and furnishing 11 transitional homes for families.
- 56 Décor Boutique volunteers devoted 14,732 hours picking up donations, staging furniture, and assisting customers in the store.
- Dozens of volunteers contributed 2,971 hours planning, organizing, and contributing to our 2022 Boots & Bling Summer Art Event.
- Additional volunteers gave 3,843 hours of service to the Family Center, Poverty Bay Café, and Operations Team.
